The Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) is the primary funding source allocated to the School Readiness (SR) program. The SR program helps lowincome families who work or participate in education access high-quality care. Florida receives around \$610 million in federal funding annually to administer the SR program. As the lead agency for the administration of the CCDF, the Division of Early Learning (DEL) plays a pivotal role in managing and overseeing the program. DEL is responsible for reviewing and revising Florida's state plan for the CCDF program every three years per regulation. DEL will provide an overview of the plan and how DEL engages partners, demonstrating their commitment to transparency and collaboration.
