

As we wrap up the final week of Florida's 2024 Legislative Session, the bills we were tracking have essentially died in committees.

- Sunday, March 3rd, marked the 55th day of the session, which means any bills that have not already had their second reading are declared dead.
- Wednesday, March 6th, was day 58 when the chambers halted voting on bills unless they were sent over in messages from one chamber to another.
- On Friday, March 8th, the House and Senate vote on the budget and adjourn Sine Die, which marks the official close of legislative business.

### **[HB 1173/SB1254](#): Dental Therapy**

*Authorizes Medicaid to reimburse for dental services provided by certain mobile dental units; creates Council on Dental Therapy; specifies licensure requirements, services, limitations, & prohibitions relating to practice of dental therapy; requires DOH, in consultation with Board of Dentistry & AHCA, to submit reports to Legislature. ### **[HB 929/SB 916](#): School Readiness Program**

*Increases eligibility for School Readiness subsidies through the Early Learning Coalition (from 150% FPL to 55% SMI); increases the rates paid to centers, schools, and family child care homes providing early learning through the program (i.e. "reimbursement rates"). ### **[HB 635/SB 820](#): Child Care and Early Learning Providers**

*Creates an early learning tax credit so that employers who offer a subsidy to cover part of the child care costs for the children (or grandchildren) of their employees - or who create on-site*



*child care - can be reimbursed for those costs. Also proposes several changes aimed at easing regulatory burdens on child care businesses, including: it simplifies the health and safety inspection process (defining only two classes of violations); allows for a 45-day provisional hire status for child care employees whose background checks take more than five days; institutes free online training to meet the minimum requirements to become a child care teacher; and expands the abbreviated inspection plan for licensed facilities that have not had more than three of the same Class 2 violations and meet other standards. Finally, expands current insurance and zoning protections for family child care homes to include large family child care homes, a provider type that did not exist when the current provision was signed into law. #### **[HB 847/SB 1400](#): School Readiness Program**

*Focused on better serving children with special needs and supporting the educators who work with them. Changes the criteria for children with special needs to receive priority in the School Readiness program, and for the providers serving them to receive the special needs differential. The proposed change would mean that a child with an Individualized Family Support Plan (IFSP) would be eligible—not only those who have an Individualized Education Plan (IEP). It would also expand funding for infants, toddlers, and school-age children in afterschool programs - not just 3- and 4-year-olds as the law allows today. Finally, the bill proposes that providers serving children with special needs undergo 10 hours of “inclusive early learning practices” training to receive the differential funds, with the intent to ensure teachers are equipped with extra skills to manage all children in the classroom. #### **[HB 1353/SB 1026](#): Early Learning**



*Proposes a range of changes to the state's VPK and School Readiness Programs to better support children, providers, and Early Learning Coalitions. Aligns qualifications for a lead instructor in a summer VPK program to match those required during the school year (i.e. a CDA or equivalent), meaning a larger group of providers might participate in that option. Codifies the importance of "executive function" as a critical developmental domain. Creates new rules for device use to limit one-child-to-a-device time, mandating devices only be used during VPK time for assessments. Finally, creates a summer bridge program for students who are struggling at the end of the VPK year to have an additional four hours a day of early literacy supports to help prepare them for kindergarten. **HB 1267 | SB 7052: Economic Self-Sufficiency**

*Proposes a range of changes to public benefits programs across the state to better set up individuals and families for economic self-sufficiency—meaning by the time they reach the exit threshold for a benefit, their family income can support that burden. Related to child care, creates a new School Readiness Subsidy Program that covers families from 85% SMI (the exit of the existing School Readiness program) up to 100% SMI. (House, Ordered enrolled on Wednesday, March 6, 2024 4:09 PM; Senate, Laid on Table, refer to CS/CS/HB 1267 -SJ 841 on Wednesday, March 6, 2024)*
