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Message from FHSA President & Executive Director

Dear Members, Partners, and Friends of the Florida Head Start Association,

We are pleased to present the Florida Head Start Association's (FHSA) Annual Report for the fiscal year October 1, 2022, to September 30, 2023. This past year has been one of significant growth, challenges, and success for our community. Together, we have worked diligently to ensure that Florida's children and families receive the support, education, and opportunities they need to thrive.

At the core of our mission is the belief that every child, regardless of background or circumstance, deserves the opportunity to build a strong foundation for future success. This is why FHSA is focused on providing the resources and support needed for Head Start/Early Head Start programs across the state to be successful.

During this year, Head Start programs faced significant challenges due to a shortage of qualified staff. The early childhood workforce, which includes Head Start, is among the lowest 10% of professions in terms of compensation. This poses a threat to the stability and effectiveness of Head Start programs. The situation is further compounded by inflation, which means that the Head Start workforce is losing ground, leading to unprecedented turnover. However, the resilience of our Head Start programs and the families we serve has been genuinely inspiring. Thanks to our network's collective effort and our organization's support, Head Start programs in Florida have continued to deliver high-quality early childhood education, health, and family support services to over 40,000 children and families across the state.

Our accomplishments would not have been possible without the unwavering support of our community partners, advocates, and donors. Your contributions, whether through funding, volunteerism, or advocacy, have been the backbone of our success. We extend our deepest gratitude to each of you for your commitment, which has been instrumental in helping us create meaningful change in the lives of Florida's children.

As we look ahead, we remain focused on prioritizing innovation, collaboration, and advocacy. We are determined to address the evolving needs of our communities and ensure that every child has access to the comprehensive services that Head Start provides. Together, we can continue to make a lasting impact, and I invite you to join us in this vital work.

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




Financials

Our achievements this year reflect the dedication of our members. With their support, the Florida Head Start Association continued serving Head Start/Early Head Start, Migrant and Seasonal Head Start/Early Head Start and Child Care Partnerships, connecting them with peers statewide and providing updates on early care and education. Though we didn't host an annual conference, we held the Annual Leadership Training, SSCBT certification course, webinars, and virtual professional development opportunities. FHSA saw a 55% membership increase in 2022-2023, ending with 128 Grantee Recipients, 14 Corporate Friends, and 9 Individual Friends—evidence of our growing influence and impact.

FY 22-23 Total Expenses \$229,178.02




Advocacy and Leadership in Early Learning

FHSA represents the Head Start community's interests at both state and federal levels. The Executive Director of FHSA serves as a key member of the Early Learning Consortium, a group of influential early learning leaders who collaborate to improve Florida's early learning system. This partnership benefits the hundreds of thousands of children served annually. Who Are ALICE Children?

In 2019, 17% of children below the ALICE Threshold in Florida were infants (0–2 years), 12% were preschool-age (3–4 years), and 71% were school-age (5–17 years). Children in Florida's struggling households are from all demographic groups; they include children born in the U.S. and abroad, of all abilities and races/ethnicities, living with parents or guardians who are married or single, working or not working.

National Advocacy and Program Development

FHSA participated in the National Head Start Association's Fall Leadership Institute (FLI) and Winter Leadership Institute (WLI), where representatives engaged in 50 Hill visits, with 45 attendees participating in these advocacy efforts. Additionally, FHSA created a Head Start Dashboard, offering a visual overview of the statewide presence of Florida's Head Start and Early Head Start programs. This dashboard highlights the impact of federal-to-local funding and illustrates the need for additional support to further strengthen early care and education in the state.

Additionally, the National Head Start Association awarded Representative Federica Wilson (D-FL-24) with the PROMISE (Protecting Our Most Important Students Early) Award for her continued support of Head Start.



Children's Week and Advocacy

FHSA sponsored Children's Week and facilitated participation in Hill Day meetings during this week-long event in Tallahassee. Representatives from programs throughout the state met with legislators to advocate for early learning issues. Participating programs included:

Leadership Development

Bridgette Davis, a member of the FHSA Board of Directors, was selected for the inaugural class of the Early Childhood Policy WORKS Advocacy Fellowship (ECPWAF). This fellowship brought together a diverse group of teachers, parents, directors, and early childhood stakeholders who were trained to serve as advocates and leaders in local, state, and national conversations about early childhood education and workforce issues.

Commitment to Child Safety

Head Start programs adhere to strict standards of conduct related to reporting child abuse and neglect. The Head Start Program Performance Standards set high benchmarks for ensuring children's health and safety, which remain central to FHSA's mission. In alignment with other states, FHSA actively participates in April's Prevent Child Abuse Month to raise awareness and promote child safety.

Congressional Engagement

FHSA assisted various programs in arranging visits with Congressional Members in their local districts, fostering direct communication between lawmakers and early childhood advocates.


- Partnering with Teachstone to provide FHSA members with discounted trainings to access Teachstone's on-demand courses and facilitated the CDA with the CLASS® program.
- Partnering with Nick the Music Man at PlayMotion Music to offer complimentary, live music and movement classes to educators and their classrooms for 5 month, with a over 500 classrooms participating throughout Florida.
- Sponsoring the 36th Annual One Goal Summer Conference, bringing together Florida's early education and care providers and leaders from around the state to provide professional development sessions, and nominating Wanda Minick, FHSA Executive Director, to serve on the planning committee.

Member Engagement

FHSA partners with the Florida Head Start Collaboration Office (HSCO) to focus on finding solutions with government agencies and partner organizations to ensure that Florida's most vulnerable young children and families receive high quality, locally designed, comprehensive services and support. Every three years, FHSA and HSCO produce a Statewide Needs Assessment that provides programs with tools to evaluate and set fair compensation rates for supporting compliance with Section 653 of the Head Start Act.

In addition, FHSA delivered member engagement initiatives to our members through the following ways:

- Member Spotlight Campaign: An initiative lead by the FHSA Membership Committee, a social media campaign titled #ThankfulThursday was an opportunity for Head Start/Early Head Start members, corporate friends, or individual friend members to recognize the work being done to help elevate the Head Start voice throughout Florida.
- **Recruitment Tools**: FHSA developed Family Enrollment & Staff Enrollment Recruitment toolkits to assist programs with recruiting staff and finding qualified children and families.
- Head Start Awareness Month: Every October, FHSA joins the Office of Head Start, Head Start Associations, and
 programs nationwide to celebrate Head Start Awareness Month by sharing videos, stories, photos, and testimonials
 about the impact Head Start has made on the millions of children and families who have benefitted from this program
 nationwide.



FHSA Awards Program

Each year, FHSA partners with the Region IV Head Start Association (RIVHSA) and the National Head Start Association (NHSA) to honor and recognize our Head Start and Early Head Start employees, parents, alumni, volunteers, and community partners who do the vital work necessary to keep the program and their teams thriving.







Florida Head Start Program Quick Facts
