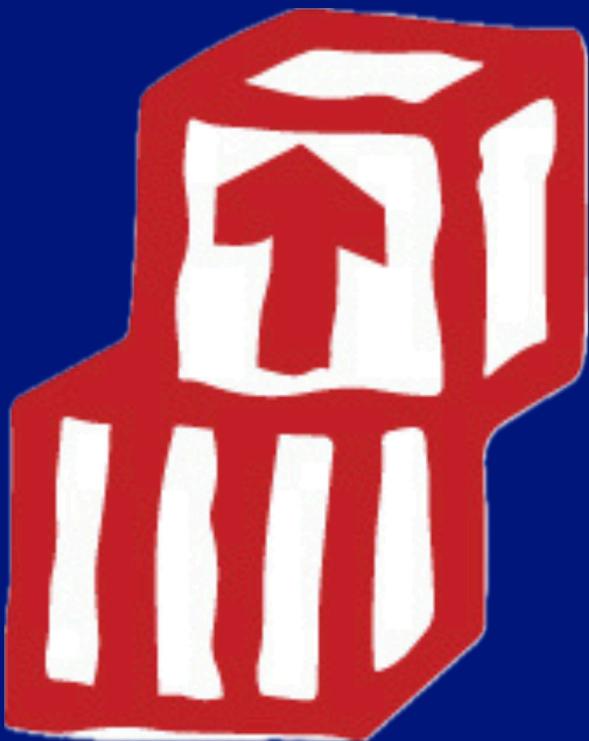


Head Start's Impact in Florida FY2025

\$492,802,267 MILLION IN FEDERAL FUNDING ADDED TO FLORIDA'S ECONOMY



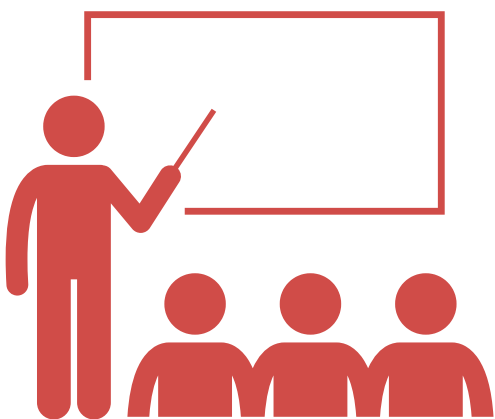
SUPPORTING JOBS IN FLORIDA

- 28,347 HS/EHS parents employed, in school or in job training



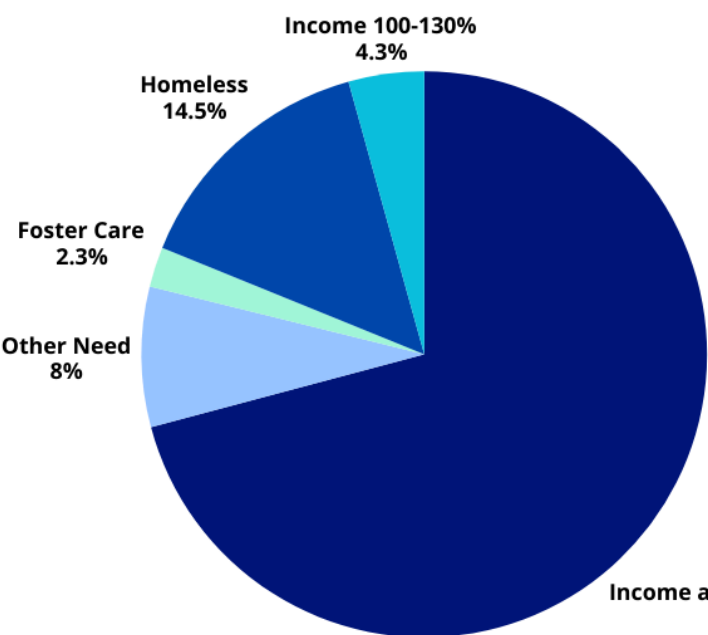
CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

- 45,523 cumulative children and 41,556 families served
- 35,155 families received services promoting outcomes
- 108,820 home visits conducted
- 38,116 children received equal or greater than 1,020 classroom hrs

HEAD START BY THE NUMBERS

- 2,537 homeless families served
- Over 7,288 fathers were involved in their child's educational experiences
- 2,793 classrooms across Florida
- 5,184 children served with a disability
- 34,656 children were up to date on preventative and primary health care according to EPSDT schedule
